Celebrating Mental Health Week May 7-13, 2018

Millions of Canadians will be rallying together to celebrate Mental Health Week in their communities. Mental Health Week exists to bring awareness and elicit conversations about the importance of staying mentally healthy, and what to do when you're not.

Why is it important to be aware?

Chances are, you're not well informed. Being properly informed about your mental health can prevent you or a loved one from falling victim to negative beliefs and perceptions propagated by the media and entertainment industry. Being properly informed can also aid in seeking appropriate help to prevent matters from getting worse.

Members of the general public often do not know how to respond. It is not uncommon for people to ignore or feel helpless when a loved one is struggling with their mental health. This may cause the person to feel as though no one is listening which can further their feelings of isolation and lack of communication. Many times, a person who is struggling is looking for an opportunity to talk about it, but feels uncomfortable expressing themselves, thereby making it even more difficult to start a conversation, even if you are prepared or willing to do so.

There is stigma associated with mental health problems and illnesses. Imagine if everyone received the same care and attention to their mental health as they did for, say, a broken arm. Mental health issues are not always as easy to see as an obvious physical injury, or understand – even for the person experiencing it. It is even more difficult to admit to having problems because of the fear of how they will be perceived by the public, or by you.

Mental Health is not just about Mental Illness!

Not everyone who is feeling blue is going to be diagnosed with depression. Not everyone who feels anxiety will have an anxiety disorder. Mental Health is about being aware of the variety and intensity of emotions within ourselves and allowing ourselves to express them accordingly. Mental Health is about resilience: the ability to cope with everyday challenges and the courage to seek out supports when challenges become too much.

How Can You Help?

There are many ways to help yourself or your loved one. The first step is to talk to someone you trust. Tell them how you're feeling. Sometimes just talking about it can help immensely. There are a number of community based organizations who will also help you talk about it and seek the appropriate direction, depending on what you're experiencing. Organizations such as the

<u>Canadian Mental Health Association Durham</u> are free of charge and have a number of available resources through their website.

Festival of Faith to

"Turn the Church Inside Out"

An interview with Rev. David Moore, visionary behind the Festival of Faith

The United Church of Canada is kicking off <u>the 43rd General Council</u> with the <u>Festival of Faith</u>. This celebration of our work and witness through the arts takes place July 21-22, 2018 in Oshawa, Ont.

The festival will be infused with an old-time country fair vibe, and feature an inspiring and joyful line-up of workshops, musicians, authors, dancers, storytellers and craftspeople. There will also be opportunities to connect and offer your own voice and artistry in the coffee house or on the green.

The Rev. David Moore is the minister at Simcoe St. United Church in Oshawa and the Festival of Faith co-ordinator. More noteworthy, he is the festival's chief visionary. Here, Rev. Moore speaks with Kathryn Dorrell (senior editor in the General Council Office's Communications Unit) about how the festival will bring the spirit and message of the church into the wider community and kindle a new spark of optimism and creativity among church people.

Festival of Faith (continued)

What do you want the Festival of Faith to bring to the wider community?

"The festival will show that the United Church is open to the world, in faith, spiritual practices, and in a practical way. It's important that it is barrier-free. There is no admission fee and everyone can come. There are no physical barriers such as bleachers in the performance area so people living with disabilities will be able to access the space.

"It is going to be powerful, inspiring and lift up the GC43 message of Risking Faith and Daring Hope. This is important to Oshawa. We are a community that has experienced the crumbling of our economic foundation, manufacturing, and we want people to see that the United Church has a vision and words of hope for our world, and a way to lift people up."

How did you come up with a vision for the Festival of Faith?

"Over the last couple of generations, we have thought of faith happening inside our building and sanctuaries. I thought about taking the things that we associate with church and spirituality in our buildings—the sanctuary, the church hall, the choir room or loft, the kitchen, the narthex, etc.—and putting them outside."

Give us an example of "turning the church inside out."

"Inside our churches, we pray, sing, listen to music and readings, and it is where we congregate. I want the festival to do these things out in the world where anyone in the community can come and participate. The festival is turning the church inside out. [For example,] the church kitchen is the place where we talk about changing the world. It is buzzing with energy and ideas. The festival will replicate this with workshops."

How will the workshops inspire participants?

"Many churches and congregations are stuck. They are doing the same thing they have done for years but are not getting the same results. The workshops will explore new ways of doing things in churches; using church buildings in a new way is one example. If you want to be the centre of your community, your church has to be a community centre in which renters and 'outside groups' that use the space are embraced as part of who the church is. It is their spiritual home, too. We need to reset the idea that church is all about the people who come out on Sunday morning."

What role will artists and performers play other than offering entertainment?

"There will be a range of artists from musicians, singers, painters, photographers and poets, people reading out loud—people who use their skills, ideas and arts to engage with the world. They will show that God is active in the world and speak to our souls. In my mind, any music and arts festival is spiritual, but most are not connected to a particular faith or denomination. They [embody] that philosophy that we hear so often today of being 'spiritual but not religious.' The Festival of Faith will be a new way for the United Church to engage with God in the world."

Overall, what message do you want church folks to take away from the festival?

"There is bit of a sense in the world today and in the church that the sky is falling. But people will come away from the festival and the GC43 energized and positive about the future. They will see that God is leading us out into the world and showing us the way."



What would you give up to protect your loved ones? Your life? In her heartbreaking, triumphant and elegantly written memoir, <u>Prisoner of Tehran</u>, Marina Nemat tells the heart-pounding story of her life as a young girl in Iran during the early days of Ayatollah Khomeini's brutal Islamic Revolution.

In January 1982, Marina Nemat, then just sixteen years old, was arrested, tortured and sentenced to death for political crimes. Sentenced to death for refusing to give up the names of her friends, she was minutes from being executed when she was plucked from the firing squad and had her sentence reduced to life in prison. Lyrical, passionate and suffused throughout with grace and sensitivity, Marina Nemat's memoir is like no other. Her search for emotional redemption envelops her jailers, her husband and his family, and the country of her birth -- each of whom she grants the greatest gift of all: forgiveness.

For the last half of our meeting we will be voting on and choosing the books to read for the next year - September 2018 to May 2019. Each person is asked to submit no more than 3 titles for each of the 3 categories:

General – can be fiction or non-fiction.



Save the Roof! Why are we doing this?

In the beginning, when the church was being built in 2003ish, one of the shingling products on the market was one called "organic" shingles. Everybody sold them. We in Canada and the US were, and still are, going through an organic revolution. Yes, we the church, need to be environmentally friendly, and we are. However, there is always more we can do.

What are Organic shingles? People are becoming more and more interested in all-natural products. But did you know that organic shingles have been around for centuries? Simply put, they are a basic, pure asphalt shingle. They consist of a felt paper soaked in asphalt and then covered in asphalt granules.

So what's the problem? Well, the good news is that the roof is not leaking...but how long can we afford to wait? Though organic shingles are a good, environmentally friendly option, they have a tendency to lose their granules easily and start curling prematurely. Often times the organic shingle manufacturer would warrant them for 25, 30 years or longer. However, many homeowners and



businesses with organic shingles noticed the shingles they had purchased started to curl up or crumble after only a few years from the time they were installed. The premature failure of organic shingles is particularly prevalent in northern and western parts of the United States and Canada where rain. snow, sleet, hail, high-winds and extreme temperature variations occur. The bottom line manufacturers oversold their warranty with these "superior" shingles having a lifetime of 12 years less than the composite (asphalt and fiberglass mix) shingles available in this market.

What about our warranty? While class action lawsuits have been settled with several manufacturers, we are not able to benefit from this legal action due to the age of the roof and the lack of records identifying our roofing material and contractor.

Is the roof important? Well, maybe that's a rhetorical question! Having a physical presence in the community has provided us not only a place of worship but it has also fostered a very diverse outreach program. Just to name some activities: a local daycare centre; a place to celebrate music (in the sanctuary); a community meeting centre for Vacation Bible School, Brownies, senior exercise classes and karate classes; and community services such as Canadian Blood Services blood donor clinics, food bank and election polling centre.

Save the Roof! (continued)

So, what are we doing about it? A Request for Proposal (RFP) stating our needs was issued in February. Several companies, large and small, local and GTA-based responded. Your Property Committee is now reviewing all the proposals and talking to the companies to better understand what our choices are. The shingles being proposed are laminated, fiberglass core/asphalt/granular coated and are part of the overall roofing system, which includes ice/water shield, complete roof coverage with a membrane, and proper ventilation. The warranty - now that is a challenge to understand. If you are asking us to be environmentally friendly, the fiberglass is actually better on the environment and easier to recycle than 'organic' shingles. Our committee hopes to provide a recommendation to the Council in mid-May.



...and what is it going to cost, you ask? At Westminster, we are very fortunate. We have a very generous congregation. We have some reserve funds and we are part of a resourceful larger presbytery. Our Stewardship Committee will be trying to make the most of those options to develop their recommendations to Council for paying the bill. In the interim, we did start the "Save the Roof" campaign. Please consider supporting this initiative as best you can. All bundles of shingles count!

So...stayed tuned. We will be getting back to you with what we hope will be a solution that is acceptable to the congregation.
