### June is Pride Month

#### International AIDS Candlelight Memorial: Sunday May 26, 7:00pm – 8:00pm.

In partnership with AIDS Committee of Durham Region, this service will be held in the sanctuary. Members of Westminster, as well as our community are welcome to attend this service, which will involve a short and personal ceremony of remembrance and healing for families and friends of those lost to AIDS/HIV. The service will be followed by a time of gathering and conversation in the narthex. Refreshments will be provided by the Parish Mosaic Committee.

### Rainbow Pride Flag:

As is our tradition, we will again be displaying the Rainbow Pride Flag in the Narthex window for the month of June. The flag will be going up after worship on May 26<sup>th</sup>.

#### Multi-Faith Pride Service and Parade: Sunday June 2 (Time: TBD)

This year's event will be held in Ajax. More details will follow as they become available. This is an excellent opportunity to support the LGBTQ community (AND get a great start on your 10,000 steps!)

#### Youth Pride Event: Saturday June 8, 2:00pm – 4:00pm.




### To get started, follow these steps:

### A Trip Down Memory Lane

Margaret Motum, our Minister of Music, recently came upon this *Observer* article from 60 years ago which recounts the building of St. Paul's United Church in Sudbury. Her father, Rev. Charles Newton, was the minister at St. Paul's at the time. Having recently celebrated our 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary, in our second church building, it is especially interesting to note how this Sudbury congregation was inspired to pull together and build their place of worship.

Sudbury congregation builds A Do-it-Yourself Church OBSERVER, JUNE 1,1959 by M.B. Pengelley

In the nickel city of Sudbury, the mining and smelting hub of northern Ontario with a population of 50,000, they specialize in doing things the unusual way—even when it comes to building churches.

A year ago when the building committee of St. Paul's United Church looked over the lowest tenders they were startled. The rock-bed estimates were \$45,000 more than the congregation could afford. It looked as though St. Paul's, whose basement had been built 10 years before, was going to have to wait another 10 year for a sanctuary.

But after the Rev. Charles R. Newton delivered a few lively sermons about Nehemiah and the rebuilding of the walls of Jerusalem, St. Paul's was able to recruit a work force of 200 male volunteers.

Last fall St. Paul's Church, in west-end Sudbury, was dedicated a month ahead of schedule and this spring the finishing touches will be completed and the landscaping done. Mr. Newton says the church was build for \$185,000 but that hired labour would have shot the completion cost up to \$250,000.

Actually, St. Paul's Church was built in three separate stages, all by volunteer help. The basement was built in 1949 for \$28,000 (at a saving by volunteer labour of \$13,000). The church gymnasium was built three years later for \$15,000 (at a saving of \$5,000). Then the main sanctuary was erected last year at a cost of \$153,000 (and a saving of about \$47,000). Mr. Newton says that the total saving in labour costs has saved the congregation at least \$65,000.

To get the ball rolling on the last lap of St. Paul's build-it-yourself plan, the congregation staged its own fund-raising campaign, pledging \$60,000 toward the new project and paying off \$15,000 which was still owing on the gymnasium.

The congregation produced an additional \$60,000 in two bond issues taken out by members of the church in \$100 amounts bearing interest of 4.5%. St. Andrew's United Church in Sudbury produced \$25,000 towards St. Paul's building fund, half of which was an outright gift, and further smaller loans and gifts were negotiated.

When it looked as though the money were in the bag, St. Paul's members rolled up their sleeves. 200 volunteer workmen signed pledge cards promising to devote five hours a week to the job. They hired a foreman at \$150 a week, took their orders from him and empowered him to hire a handful of skilled men at union rates.

Quickly St. Paul's work force was divided up into work-teams and one man was made responsible for telephoning volunteers when a big job was coming up, such as pouring the forms from 7.30am on a Saturday morning to 9 o'clock at night.

The basic building job took eight months with construction under way an average of 75 hours a week. Mr. Newton says: "We saved the contractor's profits on plumbing and brickwork. Two firms offered us considerable discounts providing we bought 70% of our materials from them. A heating engineer gave us free advice on heating problems; an expert in construction scrutinized all our tenders and saved us from pitfalls, and an auto dealer offered us a truck free of charge whenever we needed it".

Throughout the whole campaign, says Mr. Newton, the congregation's morale has been high - even in the midst of the Nickel Company strike that sent 14,000 mining and smelting workers home from work for 81 days last fall. Church attendance is up and envelope and loose plate givings increased even under the strain of capital outlays. Missionary and Maintenance givings doubled after the church's pledge campaign.

St. Paul's Church today seats a congregation of 450 but there is a small chapel which will seat another 50 people and adequate accommodation for all organizations.

The interior of the sanctuary is in white oak paneling, and although the pulpit and lectern are wired for amplification, the acoustics are so good the apparatus is not needed under normal circumstances.
