Happy New Year!

Resolution comes from the Latin, *resolutio*, for loosen, release. With the arrival of a new year, we do release what has been as we look ahead to what is possible... putting off the old, and putting up the new.

There is something invitational about the new calendar. The blank pages invite our response: what moments will fill these pages; what choices will I make, what priorities will I set? How will I fill my days and lead my life?

And while magazine covers, blogs and TV shows have no shortage of advice, I suggest that part of the new start this year as Christians is to consider the blessings that are present in life, not least of which is God's love for you. Make part of your new years' resolution a firm decision to recognize these gifts and to rejoice, not as an admission that you can't or won't or don't need to change, but rather as an admission of the wonder and love that is in your life this day, right now. If you cannot see the blessings already present in your life, you risk missing them when they come your way this new year. If you can see them in your life, they will lead you in the right direction....toward thankfulness, joy, and love.

When the author of Ephesians says to "clothe yourselves with the new self," (Eph. 4:24) it is not advice to become someone we are not, but rather to live in the light of who (and whose) we are and to become it most fully. It is baptismal language, an invitation to be what in our baptism we acknowledged and have been pronounced to be: you are God's beloved children. Wear *those* clothes in the world.

As you put up the new calendar consider all the potential and possibility that the days hold out for you, beginning with today. You are loved. You are a beloved child of God. May God be your new year, new start, new clothes, and your companion on the way, throughout 2019 and always.

With regard to transportation, this applies to schools, medical, employment assistance and recreational as examples. AFFIRMING - THE NEED IS REAL

- Conservative estimates are that 4.5% of the population identify as LGBTQ.
- Over 50% of LGBTQ have contemplated suicide. This is due in large part to isolation, lack of support and/or rejection by parents, friends, institutions and many major religions.
 - 33% have attempted suicide (compared to 7% of the general population).
 - ♦ LGBTQ youth are 8 times more likely to attempt suicide than youth in general.
- ♦ 47% of trans youth have contemplated suicide and 19% attempted it *in the past year!*

As an Affirming Congregation, one of our key allies in this is **PFLAG** (<u>Parents and Friends of Lesbians And Gays</u>)



PFLAG Durham is a very active "Not for Profit" organization, almost entirely run by volunteers. Their numerous programs and activities include:

Annual Multi-Faith Pride Service, BBQ and Parade.

PLAG Durham is a prime founding supporter of this annual event. Held the 1st Sunday of June. Westminster United Church is a proud supporting participant in this event.

<u>Coffee/Sharing Night</u> is a social support night for everyone, including allies and families, held on the last Thursday of every month (excluding December).

<u>Peer to Peer Support</u> is a service for parents and allies in need of support and information. Meetings are held in coffee shop settings, offering a comfortable and individual approach.

PFLAG T & T (Teens and Tweens) is a program for LGBTQ youth 17 years of age and under. Activities are offered in social, safe and supportive settings.

<u>PFLAG YA (Young Adults)</u> is a social support program for LGBTQ youth 18 years of age and older. Meetings are held the 3rd Thursday of every month (excluding December).

<u>PFLAG Transitions</u> is a social support service for people questioning their gender identities or who do not identify with their given birth gender. Meetings are held the 1st Thursday of every month (excluding December).

<u>Parents of Gender Independent Kids</u> is a program offered in collaboration with Livingroom Community Arts Studio, offering safe space for parents with gender independent kids to bond over arts and crafts.

<u>Camp Rainbow Phoenix</u> is an annual residential LGBTQ youth leadership camp for youth 13 - 17. PFLAG Durham is in full partnership with PFLAG Lindsay and Aids Durham in this camp.


Please sign up to greet and light the candles one Sunday (or more?). Having cheerful greeters at the door to welcome people to worship is an important aspect of our ministry.

"The Ministry and Personnel (M&P) Committee acts under the guidelines of *The Manual* of The United Church of Canada. The committee functions around three roles which are the consultative and supportive role, the healthy relationships role and the supervisory role. We provide resources and support for the staff and the congregation with respect to any issue affecting staff of our church, including ministry personnel and lay employees. The committee works to build positive and trusting relationships between staff and members and adherents of the congregation." (*Resources for Ministry and Personnel Committees*, July 2017, p. 8)

The responsibilities of the M&P Committee include:

- being available for consultation and support for matters involving the church staff;
- overseeing the relationship of the church staff to each other and to the congregation;
- regularly reviewing the working conditions, responsibilities and compensation of all church staff, and making any recommendations needed as a result of these reviews to the Council:
- maintaining current position descriptions of staff, as appropriate and approved by the Council;
- conducting annual performance reviews of church staff;
- ensuring church staff make use of opportunities for continuing education that they have been given; and
- maintaining close contact with the presbytery Pastoral Relations Committee.

Members of this committee are elected for a term of five years.





Forgiveness - a Gift from my Grandparents by Mark Sakamoto





When the Second World War broke out, Ralph MacLean chose to escape his troubled life on the Magdalen Islands in eastern Canada and volunteer to serve his country overseas. Meanwhile, in Vancouver, Mitsue Sakamoto saw her family and her stable community torn apart after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor.

Like many young Canadian soldiers, Ralph was captured by the Japanese army. He would spend the war in prison camps, enduring pestilence, beatings and starvation, as well as a journey by hell ship to Japan to perform slave labour, while around him his friends and countrymen perished.

Back in Canada, Mitsue and her family were expelled from their home by the government and forced to spend years eking out an existence in rural Alberta, working other people's land for a dollar a day.

By the end of the war, Ralph emerged broken but a survivor. Mitsue, worn down by years of back-breaking labour, had to start all over again in Medicine Hat, Alberta.

A generation later, at a high school dance, Ralph's daughter and Mitsue's son fell in love. Although the war toyed with Ralph's and Mitsue's lives and threatened to erase their humanity, these two brave individuals somehow surmounted enormous transgressions and learned to forgive. Without this forgiveness, their grandson Mark Sakamoto would never have come to be.
