# PICNIC PERFECT!

### **Having Healthy Conversations**

On Saturday, March 23 approximately fifty Westminster congregants gathered to learn, and to participate in a seminar/workshop on having "Healthy Conversations".

The event was led by Betty Pries, Co-Founder and CEO of Credence & Co. Betty has over 25 years experience coaching, mediating, facilitating, training and consulting. Betty specializes in working with complex challenges, supporting leaders, and transforming congregations through tailored engagements.

### **Background**

As we continue to live into our commitment of being a welcoming church that respectfully embraces diversity, we seek to build frameworks that support the sharing of opinions, thoughts and views. Without intentional frameworks there is the risk that people will feel ignored, marginalized or excluded.

### The Discussion

People move through change at different speeds, and will be at different stages on the journey at any given time. The goal is to create an environment in which people can speak and share in a safe and open way. We discussed how communication happens using the "Intent-Effect-Action" model to guide our understanding.

### **Intent-Effect-Action**

A person's actions (comments, motions or events that are public i.e. can be heard or seen) are influenced by his or her intent and backstory. The effect of that action on another is connected to the recipient's own experiences and backstory. We explored ways we might speak with one another that take ownership for how something impacted "me" while offering the "benefit-of-the-doubt" regarding the other person's intent. Creating an environment in which people can explore and understand where the other is coming from can pave the path for healthy dialogue. This involves making room at the table for diversity of thought and opinion. Spending time with one another - building relationships, one on one and/or in small groups - can be an effective way of ensuring healthy conversations. The group considered norms our church might want to commit to in making space for healthy conversations. Below are some initial thoughts the congregation could consider going forward.

### **Draft: Framework for Healthy Conversations**

- Normalize differences in congregational life (good community includes diversity)
- Make room for diversity of opinion as another way of practising inclusivity
- Assume positive intent
- Have conversations in the spirit of curiosity and grace; practise deep understanding and listening
- The gospel is about loving the other (we are all "the other" in some context)
- Maintain a spirit of openness, recognizing that we are all at different places along the journey.
- ◆ Take the time to seek to understand and clarify (What happened? How did it affect me? When I responded, what was my intent? What is my backstory that is influencing my intent? What effect may my action have had on them? What effect was I hoping for?)

- Council to explore opportunities for small group conversations to further build relationships and create opportunities for heathy conversations on any topic
- Complete and agree on a framework for Healthy Conversations



### **Climate Disruption Mitigation Committee**

Climate change is the new buzz phrase; we hear about it so frequently that it becomes a worry that we might become complacent. Life has so many challenges, one only has to watch or read the news to see that, and here we are with yet another. Members of our committee are helping us make it easier though, by providing helpful hints that are posted weekly in the bulletin on how we can make a difference in our day to day lives. Our committee has reached out to 30 faith communities of various denominations to find out if they have an official policy or a committee that is responsible for climate change initiatives. Together we can be part of the solution.

Currently he is in a detention camp in Libya. (The United Nations estimates that there are 650,000 refugees in Libya.) Just identifying his location is sufficient to describe his plight. While our other sponsorships were reasonably able to be contacted through the United Nations, this is not the case with Freweyni's brother. Communications are controlled by non-sympathetic forces, therefore freeing him will take intense efforts. Your Committee will continue to apprise you of our efforts.

Volunteering is a strength in our Westminster Congregation. If you are wanting a different opportunity to become involved in a supporting role, Bridge To A New Home will be happy to welcome you into our group. The experience of helping our families is exceptionally rewarding and their gratefulness is ever so evident. The learning process is just awesome and guaranteed! ### Thoughts from the Cottage on Climate Change

Bill and I moved to the cottage for the summer. It is on an island at the mouth of the Muskoka River. For us it is a simpler life. For some of our neighbours, this year, with its severe flooding from snow melt and rain, it is a more difficult time. There is a lot of damage near us. Docks and even boathouses washed away and lots of shorelines, that needed sandbagging then, will need shoring up with rocks now. Too much water can be very destructive.

City homes have also been threatened by flooding. Too much rain and overloaded sewer systems leave water, and even raw sewage, in basements and subways. Climate change is real and we have to adapt. The federal government is proposing a program to alleviate basement flooding but some of us will have to act sooner. There are several actions that we can take:

\*Have a plumber install a backwater valve which will close your sewer connection during extreme rain. You cannot use the plumbing system while it is closed.

We are all learning to make small changes in our behaviour that will measurably reduce our carbon footprint. We must also support our governments at all levels who are looking at the big picture and taking regulatory steps that will make a significant difference in the state of our atmosphere and the health of our planet.

With a federal election on the horizon, as citizens, we should be prepared to require our politicians to clearly articulate their positions with regard to this issue as well as to outline specific steps that will engage all sectors of society in the mitigation process.

History tells us that a non-partisan, collaborative approach to global issues is essential. We remember that when the hole in the ozone layer of our atmosphere was recognized, almost all members of the United Nations participated in the "Montreal Protocol" which proved hugely successful. While individual actions are necessary, collaborative action is essential.

A good example for all of us is the actions that youth are taking all over the world. Let's not be afraid to have respectful conversations with friends and neighbours, and even strangers, on the subject of climate disruption and mitigation.


<sup>\*</sup>Slope landscaping away from your foundation.

<sup>\*</sup>Choose hard surfaces, i.e. patios and driveways, that are permeable.

<sup>\*</sup>Detach an eavestrough downspout from your weeping tile. Be sure to direct the water 2 metres from your home.

<sup>\*</sup>Encourage plants and shrubs that will take up water.

<sup>\*</sup>If the water table rises, have a plumber install an appropriately sized sump pump which will collect water from your weeping tile and direct it away from your building. It may need battery backup if you have power outages.

### Where did the summer go?

It slipped by pretty quickly and there was lots for your Property Committee to do.

The summer work began with the awarding of a contract to RCI Construction to rebuild the access ramps from the parking lot to the sidewalk. This was needed because, with time, the concrete curb and asphalt had shifted, making the transition rough and an icy hazard in the winter. There are still some challenges with our sidewalks so please continue to watch for the uneven surfaces. RDI also repaired one catch basin.

We have also done some work in the sanctuary. At the request of the choir, a team lead by Larry Laycock modified the chancel choir loft to accommodate a privacy curtain. The west end was widened to create a rectangular-shaped platform. There have been delays in securing the anchors for the privacy curtain but the work should be completed in early September. In addition, the wall on which the cross is located was patched and repainted. The risers for the choir were also painted to coordinate better with the sanctuary walls. There is still some work to do on broken windows and we will continue to move that forward.

The phone system in the church office is several years old and is lacking some basic modern office features such as call display and call forwarding. Bill Fisher has lead the charge and, in working with our staff, has identified a replacement product which will make for easier communications between the congregation and the church staff. The new systems should be in place in early September.

As a result of a motor cycle accident in the church parking lot in July, three sections of north-side fence were damaged. The person riding the bike suffered some minor injuries but is thankfully ok. We have been working with Westminster's insurance company and we will be replacing the damaged sections of the fence in early September.

Buds & Shrubs Renewal 2.0. I am sure that you noticed the work done in some of the gardens around the church. That work was led by Monica Veenstra and Ron Kurtz and this is the first step of an initiative we are calling Buds & Shrubs Renewal 2.0. Over the years our flower gardens have matured and we have had to remove some of the trees due to disease. Monica and Ron will be heading up a working group, as part of the Property Committee, to plan and coordinate the renewal of our green spaces over the next two to three years. We will be inviting members of the congregation to express their interest in helping out with this project at a planning meeting in mid-September.

We have purchased a pump to help remove water from the flat roof above the Narthex/Kitchen. By reducing the standing water, we will help minimize the odor which gets drawn into our heating/cooling fresh air supply. We are also exploring other more permanent solutions.

We should also add that during August, the coordinators of the Whitby Senior's Bridge Group decided to return the group to the Haden Shore Pavilion, as the planned redevelopment project there has been cancelled. Haden Shore has been their home for a long time and they wish to return. The group's last use of the gym was on August 29<sup>th</sup>. The Town of Whitby will continue to honour its contract with Westminster to the end of December.

We thank you for your continued support as we work to keep Westminster safe, secure and in good shape.
