Protect Your Garden and Protect the Climate

A lot of people started gardening during the COVID-19 shutdown. So much so, that garden centres were running out of supplies such as seeds, tomato cages and potting soils!

Gardening can be a great stress reliever...until you notice that insects and pests are damaging your plants. While it might be tempting to use pesticides to control destructive insects, pesticides are damaging to the environment, kill beneficial pollinators, and contribute to climate change.



Why not fight pests naturally? There are plants that can repel damaging insects. Here are just a few:

- Marigolds repel almost all insects.
- Geraniums repel a number of insects including cabbageworms and Japanese beetles.
- Nasturtiums repel insects such as aphids and whiteflies.

Stewardship/Finance

At our June 17, 2020 Zoom meeting, our Treasurer, Monica, reviewed and analyzed Westminster's financial health thus far. This included our "actual" numbers up to May 31, 2020 as well as the "forecast" numbers to December 2020. Of course, there was prudence in forecasting, bearing in mind the ever changing times that we are in.

For example, the government has announced it is extending the wage subsidy program for another 3 months and it has also broadened its criteria for rent subsidy for which we now qualify. And as the criteria for these government programs change, so will our financial forecast.

Of course, all fundraising activities which involve social gatherings have been cancelled or put on hold. However, we continue to welcome new ideas from our congregation. We are also encouraging everyone to participate in other "Fun-raising" events that will continue via Zoom, such as Hymn Sing and Campfire Songs with Heather V. and Monday Mayhem Trivia with Cathy Shaw and the Communication Committee.

The Stewardship Moment will continue, maybe in a different way, especially as we think about "Generosity in Unprecedented Times". It is well worth noting everyone's generous offerings for Westminster's Foodbank and we remain ever thankful for all your offerings via PAR, electronically or by mail.

Rev. Michelle offered her blessings on this, and on the volunteers who continue to do the work of our church and for Westminster, as she ended with a prayer.

Property

While Westminster has been closed to the public, we have taken advantage of that quietness to catch up on some needed upkeep. With lots of elbow grease and enthusiasm, Ronell has re-waxed just about all of the floors in the church. To ensure that you can see them, he then washed both the inside and outside of the church's windows. Only some of you climb the stairs to the mezzanine (attic storage), but when you return, you will find that they look brand new with a fresh coat of paint.

Following the approval of Council, Westminster has embarked on an ambitious journey to replace our aging furnaces and air-conditioning systems. To pay for this work, we will be seeking funding from the Trillium Fund. Our application will be submitted by mid-October. An HVAC Working Group has been formed to assist with this initiative. The members are: Ron K. (co-chair); Bob N. (co-chair); Paul P. (Council Chair); Cathy C. (Chair, Outreach Committee); Larry L. (Property Committee); Harry L. (Property Committee); and Jan H. To assist us with some of the technical details, we have engaged the services of Collins Engineering Group of Kitchener, Ontario. This company was part of the original team that designed Westminster.

The committee has been supporting the Return to Church initiative by implementing a broad based cleaning program. Health Canada registered cleaning supplies that are suitable for COVID-19 disinfecting are on hand and being used. Cleaning protocols for Westminster are also in place.

King W. led the 2020 re-certification of the fire panel, emergency lighting, horns and sensors. After replacing 5 batteries and one of the control units for the sanctuary emergency light, Westminster has been issued its certificate of compliance. We will be following this up with an inspection of the church by a Town of Whitby, Fire Prevention Officer. With no services being held in the church in June, I regret to let you know that you will miss the annual fire drill!

We have been supporting the rejuvenation of the church's electronic office. Jim F. has led the charge with the purchase of new lap tops for Rev. Michelle and Cathy. We now have the Tech Booth operating at 'warp speed'. A Rogers WiFi router and NetGear switch, both of which connect us to the outside world, have been installed and provide communication speeds in excess of 50++Gb/sec. Ethernet connections are now available in the computer room, room #1 and the youth room. **Page 4**

Even though we are social distancing, we have continued to work on the church grounds. Ron K. has initiated our spring Buds & Shrubs program. While some details of what is to be planted are still being developed, much preparation work has been completed.

The Westminster Weed Whackers are hard at work keeping the grass (and dandelions) under control.

Did you know that we are required to meet backflow prevention bylaws?


Outreach
