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Minister's Introduction

Dear Westminster Friends,

The following is what I shared with you on my first Sunday back in the pulpit after being away on restorative care since the end of May 2023. It is what I want to say again here as part of this introduction to the annual report.

I'm really proud of this congregation. I am proud of you, the worshiping community, of the leadership here for continuing Christ's ministry amidst uncertainty and change (thank you Shane, Ava, Paul, and all the Chairs of our committees and groups.) Thank you to the staff—Amy, Cathy, Linda and Ronell—who suddenly had a few new dance steps thrown at them and handled them with grace; to our licensed lay worship leaders who shared their gifts; many thanks to our Voluntary Associate Ministers, Rev. Dan Yourkevich and Rev. Sue Genge, for your pastoral care of the congregation and of me. And thank you to Maureen Dingman and the Ministry and Personnel Committee for all of your hard work. I really hope that you all feel good about what you have continued to do and who you are as a community of faith.

As I have been spending time with the gospel of Mark this season, I am struck again by how healing was central to Jesus' mission and ministry and to his message of the nearness of God's kingdom. Almost every healing story involves a restoration to community. Community is central to our Christian calling, life, and well-being. It is a gift that God gives and that we get to be a part of. We need honest community, the kind that is unafraid of vulnerability and that will make a hole in the roof (Mark 2:1-12). There will be times when we'll need others to lower us through the roof to Jesus, sometimes we'll be the ones doing the lowering. And sometimes just witnessing that happen helps us all feel less hidden and alone.

You'll read about a lot of things in this report, but what I hope really shines through is community. Love of God, love of neighbour.



Christmas Hampers

Through your overwhelming generosity, we supported 78 families, comprising 265 people, in our community. This included gifts for 125 children and 51 adults living alone. We were overwhelmed with the generosity of our community of faith, both in selection of tags, financial donations, donations of toys, shopping, driving and giving of their time. We would also like to thank the "Westminster Shoppers" who took remaining tags and were able to shop for kids using the financial donations we received.

It was wonderful to see and feel the Christmas spirit alive and well in our community as gifts were dropped off at the gym, picked up (in drive-through fashion) and delivered. We heard firsthand from hamper recipients the impact of this outreach ministry, gratitude for not only grocery gift cards and gifts, but also community -- the care of neighbours supporting one another.

This year, thanks to the generous financial donations we received, we were able to increase the amount of grocery gift cards each family received, which was much appreciated by recipients, particularly with the increased costs of groceries. Living Alone Luncheons



The Living Alone Luncheons have been very successful in 2023. There are about 50 members that are called every month to see if they will be attending and to inform them what the menu is for the month.

This Outreach program has been in existence since 1997. It is a place where people from the community and our church community can come together for fellowship and a hearty meal.

The only requirement is that you are living on your own. We are a mixed lot of men and women. Thank you to the hard-working church members who help in the kitchen and set up the tables every month.

Prayer Shawls



In 2023, Westminster gratefully received approximately 10-12 prayer shawl/blanket donations. Prayer Shawls are gifted at baptisms, confirmations and provided to those in our community who may benefit from Westminster's love and care at challenging times.

Knit and Crochet circles were scheduled to meet quarterly at the church. In the first half of 2023, however,

these turned into monthly times of creating and fellowship. In the fall, meetings resumed as initially scheduled. An exciting event occurred on October 22nd when Moderator Lansdowne, spiritual leader of The United Church of Canada, visited Westminster. Mary Shepherd crafted a prayer shawl in her honour and it was presented to Moderator Lansdowne during service.

Bridge To A New Home (BTANH)

Our group met 4 times in 2023, mostly in person, with a few members still using ZOOM. Still about 10 members were involved from the original 5 churches.

Our sponsored refugees continue to do well as they learn Canadian life. Sut, our first person sponsored has a full-time job now, closer to home that he enjoys. He does some English work on-line and wants to work on getting his Canadian Citizenship.



Freweyni and her children continue to thrive, all played soccer again this past summer, and swim and skate at the rec centre near their home. Freweyni continues to study ESL. Mebrahtom, her brother, has 2 jobs currently as well as taking online courses. Mebrahtom found his wife and daughter in 2023; they are currently living in Addis Ababa. Also, a nephew of theirs was kidnapped in 2023, and released after Freweyni and Mebrahtom paid a ransom. He is in Sudan.

Modar and his wife Rasha welcomed another baby at the end of June, Zain. They moved again in the summer of 2023, which meant helping the children register for school. They also want to work on obtaining Canadian Citizenship.

We continue to help each of these families as needed with things such as medical appointments and renewal of items such as health cards and permanent residency. We have certainly learned that one year is not enough to resettle anyone.

There were more privately sponsored refugees that arrived in 2023, most through Kingsview United Church who have held the funds for them.

We have had many discussions about our future and in the fall, we decided we would apply for Mebrahtom's wife and daughter to be sponsored as well as his nephew, but will not take on any new refugees as we do not have enough volunteers to support this. Approximately \$40,000 is needed to bring these family members, which Mebrahtom is saving for, but we may need to fundraise to help support this amount. It may still be 1-2 years before they arrive, but they will require less help from our group as they have family members here.

We will continue to meet quarterly in 2024.

Durham Outlook For The Needy (DOFN)



Since mid-2022, DOFN, formerly known as St. Vincent's Kitchen, has been operating in a brand-new building with modern equipment and facilities on Simcoe Street South. A group of volunteers from Westminster & Faith United Churches is there the 2nd Tuesday of each month (3:30pm - 6:30 pm) to serve and clean up that day's 3-course meal. Presently, the team averages 8-10 volunteers from a list of 12-14 possible names.

The team serves between 100-200 needy clients. Westminster is one of a handful of local churches that do so. Most DOFN volunteers now originate from service clubs, company-sponsored groups or other community folks.

Coldest Night of the Year Walk



In February 2023, Westminster's Coldest Night Walk Team was twenty-nine strong. Together, with support from friends, families, colleagues and our faith community, we were able to support the critical work of The Refuge Youth Outreach Centre in Oshawa.

From our original fundraising goal of \$2,000, Team Westminster contributed an amazing \$6,601. We are currently signed up to Walk in our 11th Coldest Night event on Saturday, February 24, 2024.

Food Bank (The Pantry)



Thank you for reaching out with such care - as you fill the bin in the Narthex with cans of meat, jars of coffee, rolls of toilet paper, or give financially, you are changing lives. The Pantry volunteers are proud to represent you, our church and local community as they serve our neighbours. It's humbling to see how you can change a life or calm a fear.

During 2023, we faced surprises and challenges. Some clients became healthy enough to return to work and can't thank you enough for the help you've given them through tough times.

In September, international students from local post-secondary schools started to come to the Pantry seeking help with food, as many food banks have experienced. By the end of the month, we had 25 students on top of our regular weekly clients. To seek help with addressing this need, we spoke to the Dean of International Students at Durham College. She was unaware of this and told us about the campus food bank. Within a week, she met with the international student representatives to address this concern. As a result of the Dean's assistance, we supported 1-2 students per week, moving forward.



In 2023 we served 2,049 clients and fed 6,508, almost double the numbers from 2022. As the numbers rose, as well as the cost of food, we worried that we wouldn't be able to serve everyone who came to our doors, but this community of faith rose to the challenge. We held 4 food drives, generously supported by the congregation and community. Other organizations including the Rotary Club, Lions Club and Westminster's Whitby Scouts held food drives for us, as did Glen Hill Terraces, which collected over 1,000 items.

We also could not feed so many without our committed group of volunteers who help with filling food orders, shopping and anything that is needed.



Also in 2023, Susan P and Shirley P approached us about offering a monthly cooking class for 5-7 clients of the Pantry. This initiative started in March and has been enjoyed by all who have participated. Susan and Shirley look for economical recipes using many items that we offer at the Pantry. Not only are the participants learning new skills and taking home a meal to their families, there is fellowship shared and much laughter. We will continue this outreach in 2024.

We are truly amazed how this community of faith has supported this outreach initiative in so many ways.

Season of Service



Our Westminster congregation ushered in a new church season this past fall with acts of service in support of our community. Over 3 Saturdays in September and October, the following outreach activities were carried out and supported by members of our community of faith and wider community:

Over three Saturdays, a total of 25 people across 6 service teams:

- Assembled and delivered 500 Pantry Food Drive flyers and donation bags (donated by Sobeys Whitby) to neighbourhoods surrounding our church
- Created beautiful hand-made "Thinking of You" cards for residents of the Chartwell (Colonial) Retirement Home
- Received, sorted and shelved many food donations for The Pantry from neighbours and members of our community of faith
- Helped with painting and yardwork at the Manning Mews seniors complex
- Made delicious cookies for Pantry clients and homebound friends in our Westminster community
- Helped with yardwork and small jobs inside our church to make ready for winter and the many activities planned for the winter season



Also, while not directly part of our Season of Service programming, members of our Outreach Team and dedicated community volunteers gratefully collected school supplies donated by our congregation and assembled 62 school backpacks to provide to schoolaged youth serviced by The Pantry and youth supported by The Refuge Youth Outreach Centre, Oshawa.

Parish Mosaic (Subcommittee of Outreach Committee)



The work of the Parish Mosaic Committee flows directly from the Westminster United Church "Statement of Inclusion".

"We embrace people of all ages, gender, race, sexual orientations, gender identity, abilities, ethnicity, social and economic circumstances, in the membership, ministry, leadership and life of this congregation."

The Mandate of the Parish Mosaic Committee is to provide leadership, education and support within our congregation and community as we live into our ministry of radical welcome and inclusion.

In 2023, Parish Mosaic published articles in the monthly Newsletter and/or weekly email blasts on subjects such as: Indigenous affairs and Land Acknowledgement initiative, anti-racism including ECORC Anti-Racism forum, a Pride month schedule including all faith-based activities where Westminster had a presence, Transgender Day of Remembrance, World AIDS Day, as well as a "did you know" article on the Parish Mosaic committee.

Parish Mosaic again also undertook the following projects:

- Took the lead role in organizing and participating in the 2023 Pride Durham events. It was widely recognized as our best event ever with a further increase in the number of other "Affirming Places of Worship, Durham" participating this year. Westminster United and the Affirming Worship Durham group had a high visibility presence at:
 - Multi-Faith Pride Service
 - Pride Parade
 - o Pride Marketplace Affirming Worship Durham information table
 - Youth Pride Affirming Worship Durham information table

 Hosted the 3rd and 4th "Gathering" of Affirming Places of Worship, sharing information, team building and creating an active Affirming community in Durham Region. Because of aggressive attacks by ultra-conservative right-wing groups on the 2SLGBTQIA+ community, especially transgender youth, our group has been compelled to take a strong advocacy role in their defense. The group has now grown to 23 Affirming Places of Worship, including 2 Synagogues. This initiative remains very active.



- This fall, advocated for the installation of the "Progress Flag" on a flagpole on the corner of Rossland and Gerrard. The flag indicates to the community Westminster's continued work with and support of the Pride Community, now including the Transgender community. Special thanks to Gail Brimbecom for her strong advocacy on this project and to Ava and James Tomlinson for their strong support of this initiative.
- Parish Mosaic and Westminster United continued to provide a faith presence for Transgender Day of Remembrance events, World AIDS Day event and several individual advocacy events.
- Participated in 2 ECORC Affirming forums for the Affirming United Churches in East Central Regional Conference. As we are well advanced in our Affirming process, this afforded us the opportunity to share with/mentor other United churches in their process.
- Again sent "Holiday Wishes" letter to AIDS Committee of Durham, PFLAG Durham, Durham Pride AND new this year, Durham Alliance Outreach. The letter, along with the listing of Affirming Places of Worship, were placed on the Facebook pages and websites of all 4 organizations.

Wellness

Since 1996, the congregation of Westminster has supported the principles of this committee with their mission statement: "Following the ministry of Jesus, we are called to promote physical, mental and spiritual health within our Christian family and the community we serve." Our goals have not changed. We continue to strive to meet them.

This past year, we were able to facilitate 3 seminars for our members that were also opened to the community.

- Dementia Friendly Communities delivered by the Alzheimer's Society
- Youth Mental Health Talk by Jack.org
- Caring for Caregivers facilitated by Gail Brimbecom, former Parish Nurse and member of WUC.

Under the direction of Paul Kneebone, <u>The Friendly Visitors</u> group continues to meet with members about 4 times per year including a cookie drop at Christmas. Paul also organizes the <u>Call Tree</u> that ensures that all WUC members and adherents receive a telephone call or communication from WUC. The annual <u>Easter Flowers Project</u> continued with 100 pots of tulips delivered to friends in memory of the financial donor's loved ones. <u>The Sanctuary Course</u> that was scheduled for the fall has been postponed until further notice.

The <u>Automated External Defibrillator</u> (AED) has been updated with new batteries, electrodes and special electrodes for infants and children that were funded by the Montessori School. A presentation was given during Sunday service on the simple instructions for use of the equipment and to give members the confidence needed should they experience an emergency. This device will have to be replaced in two years as the manufacturer will no longer support this model.

Although this committee is small, it continues to run successful programs and activities with the assistance of many volunteers from within the WUC congregation.

Westminster's social media communication (website, Facebook and Instagram) is maintained by the office. We are ready to welcome new members to our team. The long-standing, dedicated members of this committee are Mary-Lynn F., Lori R., Cathy Shaw (staff rep.) and Bev C. (chair).

Property

It was a challenging and exciting year for the Property Committee. The committee strives to support the daily operations of the church, perform repairs and plan for the future. As well as managing expenses, we attempt to increase income through rental opportunities.

The committee applied to the Trillium Foundation to make improvements to our heating and cooling system but unfortunately we were not approved, and we will have to look at alternative plans and funding. There were many projects completed during the year ranging from fence repairs, tree removal, installation of flag poles and memorial tree planting to the containment of black mold in the custodial room and the rebuild of that area.

We were able to exceed the budget for rental income. The addition of the Weight Watchers group, which held 5 meetings per week, and the youth cooking school Rooks to Cooks, which held classes during the summer months, was a major contributor. Also, the Whitby Brass Band and the O'Neill Performing Arts music department held events at the church. These groups, as well as the long-term renters, have made the church an active and vibrant place and have exposed the church to many visitors.

The committee was instrumental in the establishment and participation of an Interfaith Property group. The group includes 10 local churches, including United, Anglican and Free Methodist participants, and meets regularly to share information and expertise.

Trustees

The Board of Trustees would like to again recognize the work and support by our Staff, the Congregation and the Volunteers who continue to make Westminster UC a success and integral part of our community.

The United Church of Canada's new self-insurance plan was phased in 2023. The new plan implemented will reduce premiums and all policies will be renewed annually on December 1st. From March 1st, 2022 to March 1st, 2023, our premiums were \$17,413.60. Then from March 1st, 2023 to December 1st, 2023 (new plan) the premiums were \$9,655.20 (9 months phase-in). Now with full implementation from December 1st, 2023 to December 1st, 2024 our premiums will be \$14,122.08. This new plan has reduced our annual premiums by \$3,290.64.

We have an update to the \$40,000 Canada Emergency Business Account (CEBA) loan from the Federal Government and an expansion loan of \$20,000 in 2021. Originally, the loan was due December 31st, 2022 with \$20,000 to be forgiven if this deadline was met but the Government changed the loan due date to the end of December 2023. Any portion of the loan not repaid by the deadline is subject to 5% per annum interest starting January 1, 2024. Council approved and our Treasurer has paid this amount resulting in forgiveness of the \$20,000 and any loan interest that we would have incurred.

Our Church was bequeathed a generous gift of \$69,089 from the wills of Dr. Harry and Joan Sanderson with the stipulation to apply these funds towards our mortgage. Harry and Joan were integral and supportive members of our church community for many years and a letter was sent to their families expressing our appreciation and how beloved they were to our members. This gift has reduced our mortgage and our monthly payments significantly.

At the end of 2023, we acknowledge the generosity of our members to support Westminster financially. Our Council and Stewardship/Finance Committee continue to look at ways to close the gap between revenues and expenses to hopefully eliminate the deficit.

Climate Disruption Mitigation Committee

Manning Mews Non-Profit Homes Corp.

Manning Mews has 20 one-bedroom units for seniors in 5 pods on Manning Road near Garrard. 50% of the units have been and continue to be offered as rent geared to income (RGI) at no more than 30% of the tenant's income as reported on their previous year's tax assessment.

This Outreach Mission Project of Westminster United Church in Whitby was begun in 1978 with the approval of The United Church of Canada (UCC). The Corporation was established to reduce the liability to the Church and permit Manning Mews to qualify for CMHC mortgages and subsidies. The Corporation has run for over 45 years at no cost or liability to the Church.

The Corporation has recently been operated under a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with the Region of Durham. The subsidy under this MOU for the 10 RGI tenants helps keep the rents well below average for the area while still paying for normal operations and maintenance. In 2023 negotiations were begun to replace the MOU (due to end on March 31, 2024) with a Service Agreement for 10 years that would offer higher subsidies and permit larger capital projects to rejuvenate the HVAC and other aging systems. A Financial Grade Energy Audit was commissioned to examine the potential costs and potential energy saving projects and enable applications for grants and loans.

At the May 2023 monthly meeting of Westminster's Council, the annual members meeting of the corporation was held and the audited financials were presented to the members. Due to a lack of directors nominated by Westminster, 2 more external directors have been recruited recently to fill vacancies. Both of the new directors have a financial/banking background. Training in facilities management and governance is available to any new applicants wishing to become directors. At the end of the year, the CMHC sponsored mortgage was renewed at an interest rate of about 5%. The principal of this mortgage was used to buy the land from the church.

ECORC held two meetings, one in the spring and one in fall that were in person and online. There was an average of 150-175 people who attended each gathering. John Bowman, Helen Bowman, Paul Kneebone, Carol O'Neil and Susan Pleasance were part of the 30 Licenced Lay Worship Leaders that were recognized by the Regional Council in the fall. Paul Kneebone and Susan Pleasance serve on the LLWL Forum and Arthur Smith serves on the Mission Through Property and Finance.

Locally, St. Stephens of Oshawa and Prince Albert United Churches closed their doors in 2023. New ministries have begun in the following churches: Claremont with Rev. Sandra Farrow, Mount Zion with Rev. Karen Smart, St. Mark's in Whitby with Rev. Steven Davis, Orono with Michelle Hoffman DM, Kingsview with Rev. Mary-Jane Hobden, and Kedron with Rev. Stephanie Richmond. Pickering Village-Audley, Dunbarton-Fairport, Northminster and Scugog Island United Churches presently do not have a minister.

Over \$10,600.00 was given to Westminster United Church in 2023.

Treasurer's Report - 2023 Results

Thank you for continuing to share your time, talents, and finances to ensure that Westminster remains a vibrant Community of Faith for so many.

We are <u>delighted to report that we ended 2023 with</u> <u>an operating surplus of \$19,000</u>. As communicated in our previous letters, our plan to reduce the deficit had 4 components to it:

- 1. Continue to actively monitor ongoing expenses.
 - Update: Jan Dec 2023 \$12,000 below plan.
- 2. Continue to look for ways to increase revenues.
 - Update: **Rental Income** was **ahead** of original plan by **\$25,000** for the year. **One-time donations** were **ahead** of original plan by **\$19,000** for the year.
- 3. Make use of various government and United Church grants. (recap for 2023)
 - Received \$20,000 Grant from United Church for Thriving Ministries
 - Community Foundations Grant (federal government). \$45,000 received to support upgrade technology contract role for online delivery of youth programming.
- 4. Congregational ask increase in offerings to the Local Fund.
 - Update: **Thank you to all who have responded.** To date we have increased our forecast to Local Fund by **\$12,000**.

8. Minister's Comments: Rev. Michelle Robinson:

Annual Congregation Meetings are always great occasions to celebrate the ministry we share and all that has happened in the past year. It is an amazing story of God's presence and the way the spirit moves through people. We still catch ourselves speaking about returning to "normal", even though we know that the landscape has changed. That change brings challenge and opportunity; creating new spaces to gather and share, to listen and learn from one another, to love and serve, and to use creativity to reach out, build community and connect. If you are someone who has joined recently, we hope that our enthusiasm for the ministry we share has been enthusiastic without being overwhelming. Rev. Michelle's prayer is that God's

Every time someone new comes to the community, in person or online, we are made new. It releases us from the burden of thinking that we have to stay the same. One of the newest for us has been the use of technology. Most of us live hybrid lives moving through the digital and the physical all the time. Speaking in person with someone and then quickly sharing something through our phones or connecting online with others. Rev. Michelle mentions all this because it makes sense that our ministry reflects this reality. When we first started, it was seen as a temporary measure and the worry was presenting something online would prevent people from connecting in person. Habits have changed and we are learning that online engagement is still engagement. Going forward she wants to continue to lean into our online and in person ministries in creative ways, looking at what we can uniquely offer.

When we are clear and who we are and what we are about it makes it all easier. As stated in the Minister's report, with all the changes, our reason for being church is still the same. Rev. Michelle sees the church as existing to help each other grow in our relationship with God and with one another. Love God. Love Your Neighbour as

Yourself. As we go forward, we are called on to make decisions about what to do, take on and how to do it and we have that mission as our guide. Serving needs a well to draw on, so we sink our roots down deep into God's love and we branch out. It is amazing to see all of the reaching out that goes on at Westminster and is so glad that it is balanced by opportunities for grounding spiritual practice and faith connection with each other. A lot of work went into the Annual Report, a special thanks to Bev who spent many nights looking over the reports and

making sure that they were correct. Thanks to Katie and to Amy, big round of applause for putting it all together. Paul, Clarence, Gord, and the rest of the Tech team, thank you for all the work that you do as we continue to reach out to the community that we serve and live in. Special thanks to Rev Michelle, Paul and Margaret for all the support, and to Joanne for chairing the meeting. Special mention to RCB and to Tom for taking us through the pandemic and making sure that we followed all regulations keeping us all safe and together. When our Mission & Vision report came out, Shane made a commitment to follow through with that document. We have completed the first things that we wanted to do, but there is more work to be done. Thank you to CDMC for helping us remember to care for the world that we live in. Thanks to everyone here, in person and online, for caring about and contributing to the life of Westminster's Community of Faith.

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12. 2022 Financial Report: Paul Pierson

2022 Financial Report

Before even starting, thank you so much to everyone in the room, online and elsewhere for support of talents and time and finances. It takes a community to make the church work, and thank you so much for making us a vibrant community. Much work in the report is the work of Monica Veenstra who is joining online. Thank you for everything you have done for us.

Through the previous reporting that has been communicated, nothing should be a surprise. Paul highlighted that the deficit has been brought under \$50,000, as direct support came in slightly ahead of projected. The UCW made a donation of \$6000 after being sidelined for a few years. Rental revenues are picking up, this year should be back on track. Expenses are being controlled and thanks to Property for that. The Capital Fund was created and thank you for your generosity in supporting that. Our building is 20 years old and needs some work - Property again doing research on the best way to maintain and replace what needs to be fixed. Pre-covid The Pantry donations were \$2000, and last year they were \$20,000. The community support has been extraordinary. It is wonderful that we can run The Pantry, if sad that we need to. It is supported by 20 plus volunteers. Last year we moved our Mission and Service (M&S) contribution goal to \$26,000, and \$28,000 was donated. Between M&S, The Pantry and the Coldest Night of the Year Walk \$60,000 was given in support of our wider community, which doesn't include the volunteers that work with Durham

Outlook for the Needy, our Season of Service and the UCW contributions to local charities.

Comment from Rev. Dan Yourkevich - when a congregation has higher than 10% of local givings to support the wider community it is a good indication that it is a thriving community. Our report shows that givings have continued to increase and as long as we are doing for others we will continue to grow. The email from Stewardship regarding our financial situation, reminds us that our giving is about our relationship with God and what we give reflects that. All of us together can make a difference to change the direction, as we can not continue to run with the deficit.

The accountant statements will be made available and published once they are finalised. The accountant confirmed the great work Monica did. We took the statement up a notch to a Review of Engagement.

13. Motion to Accept Financial Reports for 2021

MOTION: Moved by Paul Pierson, seconded by Dan Yourkevich, to accept the 2022 Treasurer's Report as presented with the accountant's statement to be approved by council when it is finalised. **Motion Carried.**

14. 2023 Budget/Forecast

We are projecting a deficit of \$36,000 which comes after repaying the government loan we received during covid. Council has gone through expenditures, confident that they are watching closely. We are facing inflation, and we understand that everyone's circumstance is different. We continue to be very grateful for

all contributions of time, funds and talents. Paul shared the grid as a guideline to consider donations to lower our deficit. Paul is applying for grants to help the church, both from the government and The United Church of Canada. One is from The United Church of Canada to help thriving communities of faith that are affected by debt. Also grant programs are available to help support the work that is being done by property on HVAC. Sara's work as Small Group Coordinator is supported by funds received from a grant. Our M&S goal has been raised to \$27,000. We do have the funds this year to support the deficit, but after this year it becomes harder. It is good to have an element of faith, but faith requires some work on our part. Paul has no doubt that we will get there, even if not sure exactly how.

MOTION: Moved by Paul Pierson, seconded by Brian Woodlock, to accept the 2023 Budget Forecast as presented. **Motion Carried.**

Joanne thanked Paul for taking on the challenge of Treasurer. We are very thankful for him and his work.

16. Motion to approve amended Statement of Inclusion: Gail Brimbecom

We received some feedback from the community regarding our Statement of Inclusion, indicating that we were using the wording of gender and gender identities which are the same. We have removed the word gender, and have also changed congregation to community of faith to reflect terminology that is being used by The United Church of Canada.

We embrace people of all ages, races, sexual orientations, gender identities, abilities, ethnicities, social and economic circumstances in the membership, ministry, leadership and life of this community of faith.

MOTION: Moved by Gail Brimbecom, and seconded by Bill Shepard, that we approve the amended Statement of Inclusion. **Motion Carried**

17. Motion to approve Council and Committees list for 2023 as published

Shane shared his thanks to Paul and Monica for constantly keeping us aware of where we are financially, and for all of the work that goes into that. He also shared his thanks to the UCW for providing the lunch before the meeting.

Joanne added her thanks that The Pantry has money left over from last year to help provide for clients, and they haven't had to turn anyone away or limit how often people can come in a month. Thank you to Cathy Cherwinka for chairing Outreach and all the work she does.
