Our food bank has been blessed with acts of generosity that remind us of the power of kindness—both spontaneous and intentional.

On the **Tuesday before Thanksgiving**, something extraordinary happened just outside our church doors. As Pantry clients waited for the doors to open, a woman pulled up in her car and asked who was first in line. She handed that person a turkey.

Then she asked who was second, and gave Beverly, a client, \$50. Beverly didn't hesitate—she chose to donate the money to The Pantry so that everyone could benefit. Her selflessness touched us all and reminded us that generosity isn't about how much we have, but how much we're willing to share.







This spirit of giving has echoed throughout our community this fall. On **Saturday, October 4**th, 400 paper bags—generously provided by Sobey's Oshawa—were delivered to homes in our local area by volunteers. These bags invited residents to fill them with non-perishable food items for The Pantry. So far, nearly 70 bags have been returned, brimming with donations. Last year, we continued receiving bags until Christmas, with over 100 returned in total. We're hopeful that this year will be just as fruitful. To our neighbours and church members: thank you for your continued generosity. Your support helps us feed families and offer hope.





It may be a surprise to know how important bags are to the food bank. Not only are they used for donations but also for veggies, and breads and other baked goods, donated by Starbucks and Panera.

The Oshawa Metro store was kind enough to donate two rolls of produce bags so that the

baked goods can be divided for clients.





Kindness also came in the form of lemonade this September. Hudson, age 9, and Mirah, who is in Senior Kindergarten, set up a lemonade stand with one goal in mind: to raise money for our Pantry. Their efforts brought in an incredible \$205, which they proudly delivered in a Ziploc bag last week. Their parents are teaching them about kindness. The two Joannes welcomed them with a tour of the food bank and explained how it works. Hudson was curious about how the money would be used, and together with Joanne M, it was decided it should go toward lunch snacks—something simple, yet meaningful for children just like him.





Quickly realizing that parenting--even if temporary--isn't solved with treats and jokes, Patrick's eyes are opened to a new sense of responsibility, and the realization that, sometimes, even being larger than life means you're unfailingly human. It's that that time of year again... Westminster Christmas Hampers! We have been accepting applications at the Pantry and we are on pace for our goal of 100 hampers this year, reflecting both the generosity of our congregation and the high level of need within our community.

Families receive a grocery gift card and gifts for children under the age of 18. As well, adults living alone receive a token gift with their grocery gift card. Recipients have the option of picking up their hampers or having them delivered.

If you would prefer to make financial donations instead of purchasing gifts, you can do so by cheque, e-transfer or through the church office – please mark financial donations for "Outreach". We anticipate a high amount of need this season and are working to balance this with the sustainability of this ministry.

In addition to selecting a tag or making a financial donation, we will also need volunteer drivers to help deliver hampers, as well as other tasks/roles in the lead-up to delivery/pick-up day.

In order to help the congregation better understand the work and the workings of the church, each month the Newsletter will be featuring one of the committees which make up the Church Council.

This month, the focus is on the Westminster's Outreach Team.

COMMITTEE

It could be said that everything we do at Westminster is a form of Outreach, so we're all part of this ministry.

The programs managed by the Outreach team are the following:

The Pantry - our food bank- We see 55-80 clients each Tuesday morning and do a cooking class once a month

The Backpack program - 75 backpacks are given out to children in elementary school

Christmas Hampers - 90-100 families and adults living alone are helped each Christmas

Faith and Fellowship -meets the 2nd Wednesday of the month at Westminster

Hats, Mitts and Socks - collected during Advent for distribution to local shelters and schools

Living Alone Lunch - held the first Wednesday of the month at Westminster

Prayer Shawl Ministry – shawls are knitted for baptisms, people in need of support, and graduating high schoolers

Bridge to a New Home - a group of 5 churches that have supported bringing refugees to Canada


A couple of projects we're working on this year are a garden to grow vegetables for our Pantry clients and a lending library.

Parish Mosaic Committee is also under Outreach and its purpose is to provide leadership, education and support within our congregation and community as we live into our ministry of inclusion. Kirsten G is the chair of this team.

Manning Mews - a non-profit providing housing for seniors on Manning Road is an Outreach program of Westminster but has its own board.

Current members of Outreach are: Maureen D., Debbie J, Joanne Y, Ashley E, Susan P., Joanne M, Beth S

We couldn't do any of these programs without many other volunteers and financial support for all these initiatives. Speak to any of our team for more information.

In his poem, *Recessional,*Rudyard Kipling wrote these immortal words:

"Lord God of Hosts, be with us yet. Lest we forget - lest we forget!"



It falls to us to strive for peace as we strive to follow in the way of the *Prince of Peace*.

What does the Lord require of us?

To seek justice, and love kindness, and walk humbly with our God.
