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Minister's Introduction

On Sunday morning, I love the warm greeting upon walking through the doors and the smell of coffee drifting through the narthex. People settled in chairs against the wall catch up on the week's events while in the sanctuary, choir members stretch into their first notes. Long before anything "formal" begins we can tell that something important is already happening.

I am especially grateful for moments of connection after the service when someone lingers to say what the sermon made them think of, or how something stayed with them through the week. All the ways that the Word takes on flesh. Which makes sense, because community--like faith--is not an abstract idea. It is seen in faces, heard in laughter, and gathered around tables where hard things are discussed and difficult decisions are made. Community is in the nourishment of pancake suppers, and in veggie trays and carefully made sandwiches after a funeral. It walks in the Coldest Night of the Year and in Pride Parades. It knits prayer shawls and packs bags full of groceries.

We do not always agree, and the work is not always easy. Yet, when Sunday comes, we still stand together and pass the peace. I like to think it's because we recognize the gift we've been given, (and keep being given) by a God who is, at the very heart of things, community. Creator, Christ and Spirit. Three in One. And a God who invites us into that same way of being.

Last fall, Westminster's Council and leadership spent time reflecting on what values live here. These were not the values that we hoped to grow into someday, but the ones already visible in how we live together. We brought the question to you, and you shared your answer: Community and Belonging; Hospitality and Inclusion; Service and Outreach; Faith and Spiritual Growth.

We may not know exactly what lies ahead, but we know who we are and whose we are. The pages that follow are the evidence.

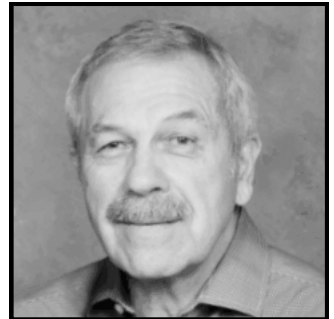

Chair of Council

One of the learnings that has stuck with me from the 2025 Advent season is the phrase – “Fear not”. I have been thinking about what I am afraid of – the future?; that someone may laugh at me?, that I may forget something?, that I may be risk averse? It is during these times that I remember - I am a beloved child of God. I have nothing to fear, God is always with me.

For me, it means I need to put effort and thought into my activities and God will walk with me on my journey.

I have also been thinking about volunteers. I sometimes ask myself “why does anyone volunteer?” My Dad used to say – “one volunteer is better than 10 pressed men” (this was when the dishes needed doing!). This saying goes back to when men were “pressed” or forced into military service – a volunteer worked harder and accomplished more than a pressed man/woman. I’m so thankful that we have a history of volunteering at Westminster. Volunteers are so important in all the work that we do here. Volunteers support the work of God in the church and in our community.

I’m also writing this letter as I consider that I’m half way through my term as Chair of Council. What a learning experience the first 18 months have been.

- Over this past year we have continued to follow the plan that was created last year. This is the 2025 to 2027 Westminster United Plan.
- Council has started to track all action items from our monthly meetings to ensure that they are completed and/or closed.
- In September 2025, a retreat was held where we discerned the values held by Westminster. A congregational survey was sent out in January 2026 to ask for input on these values. Work is continuing to finalize WUC values so that we can begin to use them in our worship and decision making.

We continue to use the Spirit and Truth curriculum for all ages (Nursery through Just Jammin' and the Summer JaM program) which is a narrative-based curriculum. Additional Story book bibles and age-appropriate bibles were purchased for use in the JaM and Just Jammin' classes. A new updated inventory supply list is being worked on for the teachers' use. Our JaM classroom has been moved from the room 1 to the Youth Room.

To our Nursery, JaM, and Just Jammin' teachers and helpers – we are truly blessed – thank you for sharing your time, energy, and yourself with our children and youth. We truly appreciate your commitment and care of our children and youth. The C. E. Committee continued looking for Youth Group leaders although a CE Youth sub-committee provided monthly activities for the youth.

One of our summer students (Prunellie) took on the challenge of developing and providing a vacation bible school program (Being God's Light) for a small group of children who participated and learned various biblical stories through story, dance, crafts, cooking and games.

Games Night happened semi-monthly throughout the year, Easter Eggstravaganza was a success - our heartfelt thank you Ava and Michelle A. and their helpers who organized the event this year. The church picnic was a big hit - a big shout out to the Food Guys who served up the wonderful lunch and to Michelle A and Heather VZ who organized and ran the delightfully fun games. Summer JaM was well attended - our deep gratitude to our summer student Prunellie and summer JaM teachers who provided leadership), and the 'Advent'ure Day lunch and activities was a successful way to start Advent.

All these regularly scheduled programs, groups, and special events and activities could not happen without a multitude of people in the background and to those people – our heartfelt gratitude for your belief in the spiritual growth for all ages, faith-based programming for all ages, building community, providing opportunities for connecting with others and your willingness to help at a moment's notice.

The Pantry Food Bank

Every Tuesday, Westminster United Church opens its doors to those facing food insecurity. This year, 2025, we served 2,728 clients, 5,516 adults, 4,669 children and fed 10,175. These special individuals have become our friends and extended family.

We wanted to share with you all, that we have had donations from children in our Church and our local community. Hudson and Mirah donated from their lemonade stand; Spencer donated from his allowance; Opaline donated from her birthday party food drive! These children were smiling from ear to ear and so happy to help their friends in need.

Special thanks to Glen Hill Terrace, the Scouts and Embers, Taunton Mills, a local Bridge Club, Superstore, Starbucks, our Cooking Class, Sobeys', Williamsburg Public School, Whitby Rotary, and those individuals from our Church and local community who gave turkeys and made birthday cake kits. Again we participated in presentations to the Embers who meet at our Church and went to meetings with other food banks in Whitby at the Mayor's roundtable.

The Pantry monthly cooking classes continue to be a success under the leadership of Susan P., who finds nutritious and economical recipes for the cooks to follow.

In July we held our first Pantry Picnic for our clients, we served Halal sausages, salads, cold drinks and treats for the kids. All who attended had a great time of fellowship and we plan to do it again in 2026. Thanks to Susan Peters for organizing and all the volunteers who helped.

Thanks also to Qais's No Frills in Whitby who lets us make large grocery orders to streamline our shopping, this has been a great help.

Our Thanksgiving food drive was well received again this year with close to 100 bags of food returned to us by our neighbours.

Our Pantry Team gives of their time so kindly and handles new surprises with tact and humour! We had many student volunteers in the summer so some of our regulars could have some Tuesdays off. We also welcomed 2 new volunteers this past year.

Thank you everyone for caring for your neighbour. It is an honour to represent Westminster United Church in this ministry.

Durham Outlook for the Needy (DOFN)

Durham Outlook, founded in 1990, operates the only 365-days-a-year soup kitchen, serving the most vulnerable members of Durham Region. Clients include folks in primarily Oshawa (as well as Whitby) --- living mostly in rooming houses or unhoused. Others may also reside in apartments or homes - but are challenged to provide themselves with daily food requirements.

Westminster has been providing volunteers to Durham Outlook (formerly St. Vincent's Kitchen) since the 90's. Our monthly team includes 8-14 Westminster volunteers, as well as 1-3 from Faith United and other community volunteers. Our shift is on the 2nd Tuesday of each month from 3:30-6:30pm. Parish Mosaic (Subcommittee of Outreach Committee)



In 2025, the Parish Mosaic Committee experienced a period of change and renewal. Sadly, the former Co-Chair of the Committee, Gail Brimbecom died in November of 2024, which sparked a change of leadership. As well, shortly thereafter, longtime Co-Chair Don Fry moved away to Aurora. As the former Chair of

the Parish Mosaic Committee, he was responsible for overseeing a great number of projects, not only within the church, but also leading Affirming Worship Durham and the Multi-Faith Pride Service. Both Gail and Don will be greatly missed.

Kirsten Grant volunteered to be Chair of the Parish Mosaic Committee, starting in September. As well, the Committee welcomed a new member, Dan Keats, who volunteered to take the minutes for the committee when Kirsten became chair.

In June, we had an excellent turnout for the Pride Parade. Many members of the congregation attended as well as Rev. Michelle and representatives from the Parish Mosaic committee.

In the fall of 2025, the Parish Mosaic committee began some new endeavours. Firstly, the committee led Queer Space Chat (QSC); this is a small group book club/bible study specifically for the LGBTQ+ community at Westminster. Led by Rev. Michelle, the QSC was a success, with 5 attendees who attended regularly over 5 weeks.

Secondly, the committee took on addressing accessibility of the Chancel. Headed by Larry Laycock, the Parish Mosaic committee has spent the last few months of 2025 working to ensure that the Chancel area of the Sanctuary is fully accessible. This included clearing a large number of items in storage in the electrical room, ensuring the ramp in the choir room was fully accessible, running new cables under the floor of the Chancel, and moving some of the video equipment and seating in the Sanctuary.

We have many goals for 2026, including reviving the Affirming Worship Durham email list, creating a video showing the congregation and the public how to access the Chancel via wheelchair, developing a recent partnership we have begun with another affirming church: All Saints' Whitby, and celebrating PIE Day (Public, Intentional, Explicit – representation of LGBTQ+) on March 15th.

Bridge To A New Home (BTANH)

- Bridge To A New Home (BTANH) is dedicated to the settlement of refugees and is composed of volunteers from Brooklin, Columbus, Kingsview, and Westminster United Churches and the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Durham. We still have about 10 active members involved from the original 5 United churches.
- We continue to help all of our sponsored families as needed with things such as medical appointments and renewal of documents such as health cards and permanent residency. We have certainly learned that one year is not enough to resettle anyone.
- Sut, our first sponsored person, continues to work at his full-time job in a restaurant in Oshawa close to his home. He does some English work on-line and is planning to apply for Canadian Citizenship in 2026.
- Modar, his wife Rasha and their children moved from Bowmanville back to Oshawa in 2025. In December, Rasha and Fareeza became Canadian citizens and this makes them the second and third refugees sponsored by BTANH that have become Canadian citizens.
- Freweyni and her children continue to thrive. The two younger children played soccer again this past summer. Jirom is now in his second year of an auto mechanics program at Durham College and will complete the program in the spring of 2026. Frtuna will complete high school in the spring of 2026 and is applying to post-secondary programs in several colleges. Tmnit and Sammy continue to make good progress with their studies.
- Mebrahtom, Freweyni's brother, continues to work at the same restaurant in Oshawa as Sut.
- Mebrahtom and Jirom both passed their G2 driving tests in 2025 and are now able to drive by themselves. In December, they purchased a used car which already has provided the family with more freedom in getting around without asking for assistance.
- Mebrahtom, with BTANH's support and through the United Church, has applied to Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) to help get his wife and daughter to Canada as refugees. Early in 2025, IRCC indicated that they had completed all of the necessary interviews but we are still awaiting their arrival in Canada.

Bridge To A New Home (BTANH)

- Freweyni and Mebrahtom also want their nephew Haftom to be brought to Canada. A second and separate application through the United Church to IRCC was made for Haftom. He continues to reside in Yemen under tough conditions with limited contact. Yemen still does not have direct access to Canadian consular services which makes it more difficult to reach refugees located there. This is problematic because it further complicates the ability to fulfill the necessary Canadian documentation requirements for his entry into Canada. As far as we know, not much has changed with his situation over the past year related to his living conditions and his entry into Canada.
- As noted earlier in this report, we applied to IRCC through the United Church to sponsor Mebrahtom's wife and daughter as well as his nephew (Haftom) for entry into Canada as refugees. After helping these individuals get into Canada, we will not take on any new refugees as we do not have enough volunteers to support the work involved in sponsoring additional refugee families.
- Approximately \$40,000 is needed to bring these family members to Canada. While Mebrahtom has been able to save some of this money, BTANH will help financially as well. It may still be one to two years before these individuals arrive. While we expect that they will need less help from our group as their family members will be able to assist them with their transition into Canadian society, we anticipate that members of our group will still have some involvement.

Wellness



Since 1996, the congregation of Westminster has supported the principles of this committee with their mission statement: “Following the ministry of Jesus, we are called to promote physical, mental and spiritual health within our Christian family and the community we serve.” Our goals have not changed. We continue to strive to meet them.

This past year, we were able to facilitate our annual series “Winter Wellness” on a variety of topics that we hoped to educate and share information.

- Sickle Cell Disease by Sickle Cell Awareness Group of Ontario
- Dementia Friendly Communities by the Alzheimer’s Society
- Stroke Survivor Presentation

The Friendly Visitors team is crucial to our welcoming congregation. In 2026, Westminster will expand this team's mandate beyond only visiting homebound individuals, whether in their own homes or long-term care facilities. Maureen Dingman will become the new Coordinator, as Paul Kneebone steps down from this role. There are presently 7 team members who contact 20-25 congregants on a regular basis. This also includes making/delivering 50-60 Christmas cookie bags, with an accompanying card and note. As well, they participated in the Easter flower distribution program.

In May 2025, there was a successful Newcomers Mix 'n Mingle Potluck Luncheon after Sunday service. Personal cards are regularly sent to congregants & family members suffering from loss, undergoing health procedures, etc. In 2026, Westminster will move to expand this team to more than its present role of simply visiting, with new roles that will vary from cooking meals for families who may be experiencing a crisis, to visiting someone who cannot physically attend church. Sometimes a phone call, an email, or a card may be what is needed. Whatever the act, the intent is to let someone know that they are a part of our church family.

If someone new chooses to visit our church, a Friendly Visitor may be the one to welcome them, answer their questions and invite them to come again. If you are interested, have any questions or just want to know more about what we do, please contact Maureen: m.dingman@rogers.com.

The Caring Cooks is a group of chefs who prepare meals for those needing support after surgery, childbirth, or bereavement. Reverend Michelle advises the team lead, Bev Crumb, who then contacts the cooks when there is a request or need for assistance. This group has been running independently and recently formalized to be part of the Wellness Committee.

The Labyrinth Circle continues to provide access to the built-in labyrinth in the sanctuary once a month and on special occasions. We welcomed Peggy Allen to the Wellness Committee as the representative.

The annual Easter Memorial / Flower Project continued with 100 pots of tulips delivered to friends in memory of the financial donor's loved ones. We expanded the memorial to include photos in the display.

The Automated External Defibrillator (AED) has been replaced with an easier to use version that can be used on anyone over 1 year old. Thanks to our volunteer, Jordyn Lessor for monitoring the AED and the First Aid Kits.

New this year, **Yoga Classes**. Gentle yoga was offered for 6 week periods throughout the year with a small fee that covered the cost of the instructor with the remaining going towards the cost of the new AED and the general fund.

The members of this committee work hard throughout the year, supporting each other and the events that are hosted as well as researching for future events. Thanks to Peggy Allen, Michelle Alston, Bev Crumb, Paul Kneebone, Mike Nicholson, and Olivia Wild for being a part of our team.

Property



Thanks to the committee members and many volunteers, it was another successful year for the Property Committee in 2025. The project to install three new HVAC units was completed in the spring with little interruption to the activities at the church.

The new units service the areas which are in constant daily use – The Montessori rooms as well as the Youth room and the Pantry.

The company that did the levelling of the exterior sidewalk came back in the spring and reworked some of the areas that had shifted over the winter months. Manning Mews Non-Profit Homes Corp.

Manning Mews has 20 one-bedroom units for seniors in 5 pods on Manning Road near Garrard. Currently with the assistance of subsidies from the Regional Municipality 11 of the units are offered as rent geared to income (RGI) at no more than 30% of the tenant's income as reported on their previous year's tax assessment. This Outreach Mission Project of

Westminster United Church in Whitby was begun in 1978 with the approval of The United Church of Canada (UCC). The Corporation was established to reduce the liability to the Church and permit Manning Mews to qualify for CMHC mortgages and subsidies. The Corporation and the many volunteer directors have been providing social housing to the local community for 45 years at no cost or liability to the Church.

Since April 1, 2024, the corporation has operated under a 10 year service agreement with the Regional Municipality of Durham. The subsidy under this agreement for the 11 RGI tenants helps keep the rents well below average for the area while still paying for normal operations and maintenance. Under this agreement Manning Mews qualified to apply for Canada Ontario Community Housing Initiative (COCHI). Three (3) grant applications were submitted in September, but none were successful. With the financial uncertainty, high interest rates and large soft costs for consultants, legal fees and reports, the FCM Greenhouse Gas Emission reduction grant application was dropped. It turned out that the soft costs associated with the application for heat pumps exceeded the 48% grant and with the elimination of the carbon charges on natural gas, the operation costs of the current heating system was financially a much better choice than using only heat pumps.

The previous Treasurer was unable to perform the duties of the treasurer and a new Treasurer, Tim Shkolnik, volunteered to take over this position with the help of an experienced financial administrator (CFO), Rachel Johns (nee Howes), who is now a nonvoting staff member of the corporation. Rachel joins Brad Beer who has been the operations administrator since his dad stepped down from that position.

At the August monthly meeting of Westminster's Council, the annual members meeting of the corporation was held and the audited financials were presented to the members of the corporation who are the members of Westminster Council. The corporation has vacant volunteer outreach positions for 2 individuals who would like to play a substantive role in this important Outreach, providing social housing to the local community.

In 2019, The United Church of Canada reorganized the previous Presbytery and Conference levels of decision making into a smaller number of Regional Councils. Along with 170 other communities of faith (aka pastoral charges),

Westminster is part of East Central Ontario Regional Council.

From Westminster, 4 lay members are elected and with the minister, these representatives sit on a variety of teams (aka committees) and attend annual meetings as voting delegates. Any member of Westminster is invited to attend but as nonvoting guests.

These representatives meet at least once a year to do the business of the Regional Council and to elect persons to the 12 Elders who serve for 3 years. In 2025, ECORC met May 23 and 24 in Bowmanville and October 25 in Alderville. Additional sessions and meetings are usually held electronically. These representatives also participate in teams and various subgroups throughout the year, mostly through Zoom meetings.

The ECO regional council shares an Executive Minister with 2 other Regional Councils and has some paid staff to assist the Regional Council and the communities of faith. The Regional Council creates and mandates 6 Teams to undertake the work and oversee the responsibilities of the Regional Council.

Treasurer's Report - 2025 Results

Thank you for continuing to share your time, talents, and financial support to ensure that Westminster remains a vibrant community of faith for so many.

This report covers three areas:

- Fiscal 2025 Year-End Update
- Treasurer's Musings
- Forecast for 2026

1. Fiscal 2025 Year-End Update

We ended 2025 with an operating surplus of \$22,000, a significant improvement over the original forecasted deficit of \$38,000.

Revenue

- **Strong December finish:** Local Fund and general revenues exceeded forecast by \$5,200 for the month.
- **Full-year results:**
 - Local Fund contributions exceeded plan by \$8,200
 - Rental income exceeded plan by \$17,000
 - Fundraising exceeded plan by \$10,000
 - Other revenue exceeded plan by \$3,700
- **Total revenue exceeded plan by \$39,000 for the year.**

Expenses

- December expenses were \$10,000 below plan, largely due to lower salary and study/travel expenses.
- Property expenses for December were \$3,000 over plan, driven by heating and cooling costs.
 - For the year, property expenses were \$15,000 over plan, primarily due to higher utility costs, toilet replacements, and unexpected plumbing repairs.
- Expenses included \$9,000 allocated to the J.a.M. Leadership Reserve for 2026 (using the 100/100/100 campaign funds).
- **Excluding the J.a.M. Leadership Reserve, total expenses were \$28,000 below plan for the year.**

Community Outreach (\$100,000+)

- **The Pantry total estimated support: \$75,000**
 - Cash donations exceeded \$37,000
 - Food donations were estimated to be of similar value (not included in the P&L)

- **Christmas Hampers total estimated support: \$23,000**
 - Cash donations of \$8,000
 - Approximately \$15,000 in gift donations (not included in the P&L)
 - 110 hampers distributed; approximately 300 people received gifts valued at ~\$75 each
- **Mission and Service: \$27,000** in donations
- **Coldest Night of the Year: \$5,000+** raised
 - *Note: Donations went directly to CNOY and are not reflected in Westminster's P&L*
- This list does not include other important initiatives such as Living Alone Luncheons, Durham Outlook for the Needy, clothing drives, and more.

Overall

At this time last year, we were forecasting a \$36,000 deficit for 2025. We are instead **closing the year with a \$22,000 surplus**. The primary driver of this improvement was \$40,000 in salary savings. Had those costs been incurred, the deficit would have been under \$20,000, even after accounting for \$15,000 in additional property expenses. In short: **Thank You! Your commitment and generosity truly made a difference, and it is deeply appreciated.**

2. Treasurer's Musings as We Begin 2026

What I Know That I Know...

- It will be another great - and challenging - year at Westminster.
- We are part of an active, supportive, and generous community.
- 2025 focused on investing in our infrastructure:
 - New HVAC systems with heat pumps
 - Plumbing and washroom upgrades
- 2025 was also about looking ahead, including updating our strategic plan.
- Community remains a core value, supported in many meaningful ways.
- **2026 is about executing our plans.**
- 2026 will **focus on children, youth, families, and overall congregational care**, with two new contract positions being added.
- We are starting the year with adequate reserves to support these positions and manage unexpected challenges.
- Standing still is not an option; we must respond to and anticipate the evolving needs of our community.
- Continued support - both time and financial - is essential.
- We must embrace change, try new things, and let go of activities that no longer align with our strategy.
- We are beginning the year forecasting a deficit, and plans are already underway to address it.

What I Don't Know That I Don't Know...

- There will always be new and unexpected challenges that arise.

3. Forecast for 2026

We are beginning 2026 with a **forecasted deficit of \$41,000**, similar to last year's starting position.

Revenue

- Includes \$9,000 from the J.a.M. Leadership Reserve (100/100/100 campaign).
- Fundraising revenue is budgeted lower than last year as a conservative measure; planning is underway for several events.

Expenses

- Staff costs reflect the addition of **two new contract positions**.
- Not all staff and contract roles were previously covered for injury and sickness.
 - Federal requirements now mandate coverage for summer students.
 - To ensure coverage for all roles, Westminster has enrolled with WSIB Ontario at an annual cost of approximately \$3,700.
- Property expenses are aligned with last year's actual spending and include a new cost for recycling pickup (\$200 per month).

Overall

- The budget is intentionally conservative - a worst-case scenario.
- There are many moving parts.
- Westminster has approximately \$140,000 in contingency and non-allocated reserves, allowing us to continue executing our strategy while actively working to reduce the deficit.
- As reflected in these musings, we remain a vibrant and committed community of faith, one I am very grateful to be part of.
- Many thanks to everyone for making Westminster - Westminster.

B.3.4 Adherents

B.3.4.1 Meaning An adherent of a congregation is a person who contributes regularly to the life and work of the congregation but is not a member or full member.

B.3.4.2 Application The governing body is responsible for deciding who is an adherent. Many people establish long-standing, committed relationships with congregations without formally becoming “full members” under section

B.3.3.3 above. These people are often valued participants in the life of congregations as “adherents.”

G.3.3 Membership

G.3.3.2 Eligibility A majority of the trustees must be members of the United Church. Under secular law, a person must be of the legal age of majority in their province in order to serve as a trustee. From the UC Trustee Manual 2021

Eligibility requirements A majority of the trustees must be United Church members [G.3.3.2]. The remaining trustees may be adherents or others.

Ron Motum expressed his appreciation to current trustees, with many thanks for the service and support over Ron’s time as Chair of Trustees. Ron offered sincere thanks to Shane Suepaul, Paul Pierson and King Whitney. He commented that they were fortunate to have some new trustees.
